(and on the S. slope of which they made their last bivouac before they disappeared), but the Ulluauz Pass (ca. 14,300 ft.), which has been crossed without much difficulty. It was reached, of course, from the S. by the search party of 1889. It is impossible to cross the Mishirgi Pass from the N.; the ridge itself runs more or less N. and S., so the crossings are E. and W.; the E. side was climbed for the first time, I think, by the French party; the W. side was climbed in 1929 by the party which made the first ascent of Koshtantau by the N. arête, but it had been previously ascended by Donkin and Fox on August 27, 1888, and by Sella. (See Freshfield, II, p. 261.)—D. L. B.
